Remembering Tpr Patrick Mullins 35 Inf Bn and 1 Mot Sqn Missing in Action since 1961 and Cav Congo DSMs.



On 6 Oct, Col Richard Heaslip (Retd, Club President in 2008) made a Power Point presentation to personnel of 1 Cav Sqn and members of the Irish United Nations Veterans Association in Collins Bks Cork to mark the 60^{th} anniversary of the killing of Tpr Patrick Mullins during Op Morthor. Col Ray O'Lehan EO & 2 I/C 1 Bde (Club President in 2019) and Comdt Andrew O'Shaughnessy, Sqn Comd welcomed the audience and the lecture covered one of the most tragic episodes in the Cav Corps history of overseas service. Tpr Mulins was the first Irishman who was posted as missing in action, presumed dead following an ambush in Elisabethville on the night of 14-15 Sep 1961. In Oct 1963, he was listed as being killed in action.



After the lecture plaques were unveiled at HQ 1 Cav Sqn for the three members of 1 Mot Sqn who were awarded Distinguished Service Medals for service with OUNC in the Congo, Sqn Sgt Daniel Carroll, Sgt Michael Rowland and Cpl John Kealy and for Tpr Mullins, the plaques had the citations and photographs of the four men.
