The Club lost one of its most stalwart members and supporters, Lt Col Ken Kelly (Retd), on the 8th May 2024. It was a sad and poignant start to the day, but there were also many happy memories shared of Ken and his contribution to the Corps and Club alike. A minute's silence was observed at the presentation of prizes. A past President of the Club, Ken seldom missed any significant event and was an ever-present at Cavalry Day, the Elder's lunch and the Annual Dinner – the last event he attended was the Annual Dinner in November 2023 at Collins Barracks, Cork, and we have some fine photos of him at the event below.

He will be fondly remembered by his comrades throughout the Corps and the Club.

Biography

O.8038 Lieutenant Colonel Kenneth T. Kelly (Retd) was born on 27 June 1943, and he joined the Defence Forces as a Cadet with 36 Cadet Class on 12 December 1961. He was a member of the Special Guard of Honour provided by the class for President John Fitzgerald Kennedy at Arbour Hill on 28 June 1963.

He was commissioned on 15 July 1963 and he was appointed as a Tank Troop Commander, 1 Tank Squadron at Plunkett Barracks, Curragh Training Camp. He later served with Depot Cavalry, in the Office of the Director of Cavalry, as an instructor in the Infantry School, in the Cavalry School and in the Command and Staff School; he was Brigade Adjutant and later Intelligence Officer at HQ 6 Brigade, he was School Commandant at the Military Police School, Squadron Commander and Camp Adjutant at Air Corps Administration Wing, Squadron Commander 1 Cavalry Squadron, on promotion to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel, he served as Officer-in-Charge Intelligence Staff at Air Corps HQ, Commandant of the Cavalry School and in Combat Support Section at Defence Forces HQ.

Overseas Service

He served as a peacekeeper in the Congo (ONUC), Cyprus (UNFICYP), in Lebanon (UNIFIL), in the Middle East (UNTSO), in Central America (ONUCA), with the European Community Monitor Mission (Yugoslavia) (ECMMY) and in Bosnia and Herzegovina with the Stabilisation Force (SFOR). Three months after commissioning in 1963, he deployed to the Congo with 2 Infantry Group in October 1963 until May 1964.

He served on two tours of duty with the United Nations Peacekeeping Force in Cyprus UNFICYP, with the Armoured Car Group, 8 Infantry Group from March to September 1967 and with the Armoured Car Group, 13 Infantry Group from September 1969 to April 1970. He deployed with the first unit to serve with UNIFIL as Recce Group Commander, 43 Infantry Battalion from June to December 1978, later he was Senior Liaison Officer at UNIFIL HQ from October 1998 to November 1999, he completed a two-year tour as an unarmed military observer in the Middle East from January 1986 to January 1988, he served with the United Nations Observer Group in Central America from December 1990 to April 1991. He completed his considerable overseas service as the Irish Contingent Commander with the Stabilisation Force in Bosnia and Herzegovina in Bosnia and Herzegovina from July 2000 to January 2001.

MEMORABILIA CAVALRY CORPS / CLUB PLUNKETT OFFICERS MESS DFTC CURRAGH¹

Carpe Diem. The Latin phrase "Carpe Diem" meaning "Seize the Moment" was on a plaque which used to hang on a shot chain over the bar in Plunkett Officers Mess from about 1960 onwards. The sign was made by the blacksmith in Cavalry Workshops, Paddy Scullion and we are presently trying to establish its whereabouts. The phrase, apparently, was much quoted by The Dean (the late Brig Gen Kevin Noonan). A very gregarious individual Kevin Nunan, who had early service in both Depot Cavalry and the 1 Tank Sqn, attributed the phrase to his Latin teacher back in Kerry. Over time this phrase has been absorbed into Cavalry Corps and Cavalry Club lore as being indicative of a Cavalry Corps philosophy. It is often used as the final salutation in Corps and Club correspondence.

<u>Irish Shield.</u> This highly ornate large silver shield now hangs in the office of the Commandant of the Cavalry School. It was the trophy for an athletic / gymnastic completion organised in the 1920's, 30's & 40's on all-Ireland basis, and was competed for by organised teams reflecting major athletic/gymnastic clubs including those from the police and army i.e. RUC, DMP, GS & DF. Based on information provided by the late Art Magennis, it seems the trophy ended up in the care of the Cavalry Corps because the mainstay of the Army's Athletic / Gymnastic Team of the day was drawn

from the Cavalry units on the Curragh. In particular, the Corps had a famous gymnast, Sgt Cleary of the 1st Armd Sqn, and a famous boxer in Sgt Gallagher (also a Golden Gloves contender in USA)

<u>Cavalry Corps Crest, Plunkett Ante Room.</u> The carved marble Cavalry Corps Crest, which overhangs the fireplace in what was the Anteroom of Plunkett Barracks Officers Mess³, was presented to the Mess by Lt Jack Harrison who served in Plunkett Barracks during the Emergency. Lt Harrison was a member of a family of stone masons / monumental sculptors who were in business in Pearse Street Dublin. The marble crest was provided at no cost to the Officers Mess, and was in fact a presentation by the Harrison Family.

Mountjoy Prison Break Commemorative Shield. Currently located in the Cav School this plaque, made by Paddy Lynch commemorates the historic attempt to release / break-out the Blacksmith of Ballinalee (Sean Mac Eoin) from Mountjoy Prison during the War of Independence. In this action a captured British Army "Peerless" Armoured Car was used by an IRA party dressed in BA uniforms led by Emmet Dalton to enter Mountjoy Prison. The members of the party each are commemorated in the signed disks attached to the shield.

Rolls Royce Royce Shield. Hangs in the Anteroom. This magnificent piece was designed primarily to display the manufacturer's badges and the names given to the thirteen (13) Rolls Royce Armoured Cars which, along with the seven (7) Peerless Armoured Cars and an unspecified number of Lancia Armoured trucks (not less than 64), were the first armoured vehicles to be used by the Cavalry Corps. The Shield was designed and fabricated by the late Coy Sgt Paddy Lynch, who drove one of these vehicles during the Civil War and subsequently served as Foreman, Cavalry Workshops from 1948-1972. He was also responsible for preserving the 'Sliabh na mBan', when all the remaining Rols Royce vehicles were sold in 1954.

<u>Katanga Cross. Bonze Cross.</u> Currently hanging in the corridor of Cav Sch.

Rommels Map. Currently hanging in the Anteroom. Was provided by Capt Sean Cleary.

<u>Cavalry Corps Table.</u> Currently located in the Anteroom. Has been known as the Armoured Sqns Table, Plunkett Officers Mess Table, Cavalry Corps Table / Commissioning Table. According to the late Art Magennis its original manifestation was the brain child of Major P.C. (Pakie) Byrne who instituted it for the Armoured Sqn Officers then resident in Plunkett Barracks in 1943.

Originally the Cavalry Corps included a wide range of varying units from Horse, Cyclist, Motor and Armoured Squadrons.

Major Byrne was of the view that the real Cavalry were the Armoured Squadrons! His idea was to

have a special table to commemorate those who served in the Armoured Squadron⁴. The table was

made in Cavalry Workshops by the Carpenter McNally. He was originally from NI and had come

south to help build Tintown⁵. This concept was later expanded to include all officers who served in

Plunkett Barracks and were members of Plunkett Officers Mess. Later it evolved as a "right of

passage" for newly commissioned officers into the Cavalry Corps to put their plate on the table,

either when they were posted to Plunkett or when they undertook their Cavalry Young Officers

Course. Given that the table was given a variety of titles over the years, perhaps the time has come

to finally settle on one. The original inscribing process was for the individual officer to inscribe his

name on the oval nickel silver plates which were part of the spare parts and stores associated with

the Rolls Royce Armoured Cars kit. The process was to coat the plate with a covering of heavy wax

and then to inscribe [name in capitals, the year and the signature of the officer] on to the plate

through the wax using a fine pointed metal inscribing tool / or bradawl. When this was completed,

the plate was dipped in wax and then rinsed which had the effect of leaving the inscription. This

process was done under the strict supervision of CS Paddy Lynch in Cavalry Workshops and the

practice continued under his stewardship as Foreman Cavalry Workshops and subsequently that of

his son until the late 1980's when problems arose regarding the process, the supply of plates and the

H&S issues in respect to the use of acid.
